Re: Shantan Poopalaraja's Alcohol Licensing Application, Crystal Palace Convenience Store, 25 Clifton Road, London SE25

I have been living in this community for a long time and I have raised my children here.

I have seen many changes in the area including the increase of violence, robbery. Burglary and gang related incidents and I have even heard of attempted rape in my area.

I want to point out that where I am living we have a pub across the road from Crystal Palace Convenience Store (Newsagent), the Clifton Arms which is licensed to sell alcohol. I am quite dismayed to see that the above, which has been established as a newsagent for many years, has applied for an alcohol licence.

I would like to point out that there is a family run store which has been part of the community for more than twenty years and has been in the hands of the current owner Mr Karalasingam Janagaraj for the past eight years and as well as selling groceries and other goods they also have an alcohol licence.

As part of the community we all look out for each other and this includes the shop, Clifton Food and Wine. Mr Janagaraj and his family have worked very hard over the years to build relationships and establish good rapport with neighbours and other community members. In the early stages Mr Janagaraj experienced much trouble from local gang members with robbery and break-ins and many

of these were alcohol related. He has taken on board our suggestions as a community in terms of safeguarding himself and his premise and family, by addressing incidents of anti-social behaviour and noise nuisance by ensuring that all his customers are aware of the conduct expected from them. He has stopped them congregating outside his shop for no apparent reason, he ensures that after 9.30pm his door is locked and goods are sold from a window. Notices are displayed in the shop so customers are aware of what is expected of them. We have no alcohol related incidents and there is no noise nuisance at nights. Customers purchase alcohol and take it home.

Having lived in the area for many years and seen how it has deteriorated, the concern that I have is that the increased availability of alcohol is going to cause more problems. There will be an increase in anti-social behaviour with people urinating on the street and also broken bottles. I am concerned that there will be an increase in crime and disorder as people resort to stealing and robbery to fuel their alcohol dependency. Clifton Road will then become like Thornton Heath High Street, which I considered to be safe before the betting shop was opened. The High Street changed after the betting shop opened and it became unsafe with an increase in violence, robbery and group intimidation, with fights outside the shop and I don't feel safe walking on the High Street anymore. The threat of being robbed is real, particularly when one has to use the cash point outside the post office, where many of the betting shop customers hang around in groups.

Whilst I recognise that Clifton Road is not Thornton Heath High Street, Clifton Road will change should the above alcohol licence be granted. I believe there will be issues with gangs as this will present an opportunity for gang rivalry, with members from different gangs becoming territorial about who can use which shop to purchase alcohol. This is a residential area and should anything happen it can very quickly escalate.

Clifton Food and Wine has an established working relationship with the Police regarding the sale of alcohol particularly on match days. Alcohol is sold within set timescales and established customers are aware of this. How long would it take for this to be established if the above license is granted?

The Clifton Arms (pub) the Crystal Palace Convenience Store and Clifton Food and Wine are in close proximity to each other and if this licence is granted, the people who are going to suffer the most are the vulnerable people including mothers who are coming home from work with their children in buggies, elderly residents who live in the area, young people coming from college or university and people coming from work in the evenings bearing in mind that we are now in Winter and it gets dark very quickly.

It is my opinion the Crystal Palace Convenience Store should remain as it is for the safety of the community. The people who will get caught in the crossfire are those who are walking.

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

Re: Shantan Poopalaraja's Alcohol Licensing Application, Crystal Palace Convenience Store, 25 Clifton Road, London SE25

I have had the store at 47 Clifton Road since 2008 so I have been a part of this community for Eight years. The previous owner did not have a alcohol licence, and when I first applied I was not successful because it was opposed by concerned members of the community.

When I first owned Clifton Food and Wine I used to get gangs coming into the shop and snatching things from the shelves or counter and run away without paying and they did this whilst I was in the shop. They would often wait for me outside the shop at closing time to try and get money from me. On one occasion they came to attack me but I managed to get back inside the shop and locked the door. They smashed the window of my car instead because they thought I had money inside my car.

They broke into the shop several times and took mainly cigarettes and alcohol. On one occasion whilst I was in the shop two gang members came in, one had a gun. They tried to get money and when they could not one snatched my laptop and ran off with it, I challenged the other one and I was attacked and stabbed in the head with a sharp object. My wound needed medical attention I

have had young people on motorbikes come into the shop asking for cigarettes but refused to produce ID when asked and instead tried to jump the counter to help themselves.

I was still building relationships with the community at this time and part of this process was listening to the issues my neighbours were having with the behaviour of some of my customers, including those playing excessively loud music in their cars. I have worked hard to address all the issues, some were resolved by putting notices in the shop and speaking to customers directly. Others were addressed by working closely with the police. My business is a family run business and I had to safeguard my family, myself, the business, my customers and my relationship with the community. Many of my neighbours are also my customers (some of whom I have built friendships with over the years) and they were the ones who suggested that I lock the door at 9.30 pm and serve customers from the window.

I have a number of concerns regarding the above application:

We already have two businesses in Clifton Road with alcohol licenses within close proximity, Clifton Food and Wine, and The Clifton Arms Pub, the pub is literally directly across the road from Crystal Palace Convenience Store.

The increased availability of alcohol will present problems for the community with anti-social behaviour such large groups of drinkers congregating from the early hours of the morning arguing and fighting amongst themselves and even urinating on the street.

There will be an increase in robberies with people stealing to fuel their alcohol dependency.

It will present opportunity for gang rivalry and I believe that the licensing applicant will experience the same problems that I have experienced.

If they are new to this community and do not have relationships with either the community or the police they are going to find it extremely difficult because they will need support.

Granting an alcohol licence will be taking a backward step and adding to the problems already present in the community. Clifton Road will become very much like Thornton Heath High Street. I am very much aware that since the opening of the betting shop safety on the High Street has deteriorated even further and many of my customers feel unsafe walking along there during the day time for fear of being robbed. Some have experienced being intimidated and asked for money whilst trying to use the cash machine. Some of the betting shop customers already congregate on Clifton Road because they have relatives living in the area.

In addition to the above I am concerned that the most vulnerable members of the community who will be affected by the anti-social behaviour of the drinkers including mothers taking their children to school in the mornings and those coming home from work in the evenings with young children in buggies, young people going to and coming home from college/university and elderly members of the community.

I have raised these issues of concern because it has taken me many years to build the relationship I currently have with my customers and I do not wish to see this hard work unravelled. As well as local regular customers I have also built relationships with regular driver customers who are either on their way to or from work. They will be affected if the area becomes too congested due to alcohol sales.

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

This is a residential area and should anything happen it can very quickly escalate.

Clifton Food and Wine has an established working relationship with the Police regarding the sale of alcohol particularly on match days. Alcohol is sold within set timescales and established customers are aware of this. How long would it take for this to be established if the above license is granted?

The Clifton Arms (pub) the Crystal Palace Convenience Store and Clifton Food and Wine are in close proximity to each other and if this licence is granted, the people who are going to suffer the most are the vulnerable people including mothers who are coming home from work with their children in buggies, elderly residents who live in the area, young people coming from college or university and people coming from work in the evenings bearing in mind that we are now in Winter and it gets dark very quickly.

It is my opinion the Crystal Palace Convenience Store should remain as it is for the safety of the community. The people who will get caught in the crossfire are those who are walking.
