The Vision

The vision for the 0-25 SEND service is that children and young people with SEND will achieve the best possible outcomes within or near their local community. They will have the confidence and resilience to utilise local community assets. The voice of the children and young people and their carers is at the heart of all strategic development and decision making.

There have been significant changes in central government policy affecting how outcomes will be met in the future for children, young people and adults with special educational needs and disabilities. The **Children and Families Act 2014** introduced a **range of reforms** for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). The reforms included a **single assessment process for integrated education, health and care plans** that reflect aspirations as well as needs; options for **personal budgets** to give families choice and control over their support; **joint commissioning** of services to meet needs; publication of a **Local Offer** of services to provide information on the range of services available ; **new statutory protections** for young people aged 16-25 in further education and a stronger focus on **preparing them for adulthood**.

In order to support the delivery of the SEND reforms - the 0-25 SEND Service became part of the Adult Social Care and All Age Disability Service on the 1st of November 2016.

This integration built on SEND reforms and **formalised the collaboration between education, children's and adults** social care facilitating joint case management to support the planning and delivery of person centred Education, Health and Care Plans for children and young people with complex needs. It also addressed the challenges of transition planning with an integrated care planning function to age 25.

Drivers for change:



New legislation

The **Care Act and the Children & Families Act** were introduced in 2014. The Acts brought significant changes to local authority SEN and social care duties to which Croydon needs to respond.



Increasing demand

There has been an increase in the number of Croydon children being diagnosed with disabilities and special needs Resulting in high levels of casework ratio per officer.



Financial Squeeze


The SEND service current have a **foreca**st **overspend in the high needs budget** and faces financial pressures as result of national funding cuts.



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Successes:

- **Co-location:** Co-location of SEN and Children with Disabilities Team
- Leadership: Creation of integrated SEND Senior Leadership Team
- **Transfer SEN statements:** SEND service are on track for the successful completion of transferring all SEN statements to EHC plans by the national deadline of April 2018. To date 70% (1750) have been completed and additional administration support have been recruited to support with the remaining
- **Provision:** Existing programme of expansion for existing special schools:
 - St Nicholas Primary MLD/SLCN/ASD
 - Red Gates Primary SLD
 - Beckmead Family of Schools ASD and SEMH
- **Funding**: LB Croydon has received an allocation of £2.9 million for capital investment in special needs school provision through the DfE capital investment programme.
- **Pathway design:** The Children with Disabilities Team and the SEN 16-25 team have worked with special school head teachers (St Giles and Priory Schools) to develop a local pathway for young people post 19. The next step is to take forward planning with Croydon FE College for the future development of an education pathway that meets the needs of young people with complex disabilities and learning needs.
- Youth Service: The Youth Services for young people age 18-25 years have been well received and are contributing to young people's development of independence in or near their local community.
